Kristine Hamann is the Executive Director and founder of Prosecutors' Center for Excellence (PCE). PCE provides consulting, publications, national meetings, and research services for prosecutors to promote best practices, spur innovations and implement solutions. PCE conducts assessments of prosecutor offices of all sizes providing recommendations for improved practices and efficiencies. She is a technical advisor and subject matter expert on many topics including gun crime, witness intimidation, ethics, crime strategy and data collection, community outreach and implicit bias. From 2013 to 2016, Kristine Hamann was a Visiting Fellow at DOJ/ Bureau of Justice Assistance and has worked with prosecutors in over 40 states on best practices. She chairs the National and NY State Best Practices Committee for prosecutors and teaches at Georgetown Law School. She was a member of the American Bar Association (ABA) Criminal Justice Council and is on the ABA Criminal Justice Journal Editorial Board. From 2008 to 2013, Ms. Hamann was the Executive Assistant District Attorney for the Special Narcotics Prosecutor for the City of New York. From 2007 to 2008, Ms. Hamann was the New York State Inspector General. From 1998 to 2007, Ms. Hamann served as the Executive Assistant DA to DA Robert Morgenthau in the Manhattan District Attorney's Office in New York City. Prior to 1998, Ms. Hamann held several other positions in that office including Deputy Chief of the Trial Division and Director of Training. She started her career as a violent crime prosecutor. She has received various awards for her public service, including The Morgenthau Award (NYS District Attorney's Association 2020), The Ethics and Accountability Award (City and State NY, 2018), Outstanding Prosecutor of 2013 (NY State Bar Association), Prosecutor of the Year for Executive Leadership (NYS District Attorney's Association 2010), Excellence in Government Award (Albany Law School, 2008) and Public Service Award for Outstanding Public Service (NY County Bar Association, 2005).

Jessica Hyde is an experienced forensic examiner in both the government and commercial sectors and speaker on Digital Forensic topics. She is the founder of Hexordia and an Adjunct Professor teaching Mobile Forensics in the Digital Forensics graduate program at George Mason University, where she achieved an MS in Computer Forensics. She is also involved in several community efforts including Chair of DFIR Review, 1st VP on the International Executive Committee of the High Tech Crime Investigation Association, and advisory board for Cyber Sleuths Lab. Her previous roles include Director of Forensics at Magnet Forensics, Senior Mobile Exploitation Analyst for Basis Technology, Senior at EY, and Senior Electrical Engineer at American Systems. Jessica is also proud to be a veteran of the United States Marine Corps.

Brandon Epstein is the Chief Forensic Officer at Medex Forensics and has been a digital forensic examiner since 2014. Brandon holds a Master of Science degree in Recording Arts – Emphasis Media Forensics as well as numerous digital forensic certifications. He is the chair of the Scientific Working Group on Digital Evidence and is a member of the IAI's Forensic Video Certification board, IACP Cybercrime and Digital Evidence committee, the American Academy of Forensic Science, and the NIST/OSAC Video/Imaging Technology and Analysis Subcommittee. Brandon is an adjunct professor in the New Jersey Institute of Technology's Forensic Science Program and regularly provides digital forensic instruction to local, state, and federal law enforcement officers nationwide and internationally.



Chris Pylar
Detective

Detective Chris Pylar has been a police officer in Colorado for more than thirty years. He began his career in Summit County, Colorado as a deputy, and then was a police officer in Golden, Colorado, where he grew up, until 2002 when he became a police officer in Westminster, Colorado. During his tenure at the Westminster Police Department, Detective Pylar was a patrol officer, field training officer, and was a member of the Traffic team, investigating and reconstructing serious and fatal traffic collisions. As a detective for more than 15 years, Detective Pylar has worked Crimes against Children including abuse and exploitation including internet exploitation. In 2015, Detective Pylar was selected as a Westminster Task Force Officer to the FBI Denver Rocky Mountain Safe Streets Task Force, investigating bank robberies, carjackings, kidnappings, and other violent crimes with a potential Federal nexus. In 2020, Detective Pylar was selected to participate as a member of the FBI Cellular Analysis Survey Team (CAST). After completing the certification process, which spanned more than one month of training and evaluation, Detective Pylar became a CAST "field asset" in the FBI Denver Division. On a daily basis FBI CAST assets provide investigative assistance, testimony, and training to law enforcement across the country and internationally surrounding historical call records analysis and other records analysis. Detective Pylar has testified as an expert witness in this arena in state and Federal courts, and has provided training to several hundred law enforcement officers and prosecutors across the country.

Instructions to Receive CLE Credit

Please Read Carefully

The Prosecutors' Center for Excellence has not requested continuing legal education accreditation for this program. Instead, we will supply you with a **Uniform Certificate of Attendance**. This certificate will include Prosecutors' Center for Excellence (PCE) as the sponsor, the title of this conference, the dates of this conference, the location of this conference as well as a calculation of the CLE Credit Hours under both a 60-minute and 50-minute hour system. We believe that these hours accurately reflect the CLE credit you should receive. However, each state has its own rules on the accrediting process which could affect this calculation.

At the end of each session, you will receive a conference evaluation. You will need to fill out the survey in order to receive the **Uniform Certificate of Attendance.**

As part of the meeting materials, PCE will supply you with this meeting's agenda, a description of the various content to be covered throughout this conference, as well as the names and biographies of the speakers.
